Frederick Todd, a landscape architect who had been in the employ of F.L. Omsted, was first brought in by the City of Montreal in the 1930s to redesign St. Helen's Island. The project, which ran out of funding before it could be implemented, focused on being a recreational retreat for Montrealers - featuring numerous small parks. More notably, there were a good number of small inlets for bathing beaches in locations unaffected by strong currents.
